**PUBLIC OPINION STRATEGIES POLLS IN TWELVE SUCCESSFUL  
US SENATE RACES AND FOR FIVE NEW MEMBERS OF CONGRESS**

The survey research firm of Public Opinion Strategies (POS) polled for Senate winning candidates in four of the highest profile races, in two of the three big GOP wins in Gubernatorial races, and five new Members of Congress. Including independent expenditure efforts, Public Opinion Strategies polled in 14 Senate and Gubernatorial statewide victories and more than 50 Congressional victories.

Major statewide winners were:

- Senator-elect Todd Young of Indiana, who trailed heavy favorite Evan Bayh by 21 points back in July.
- Senators Richard Burr of North Carolina, Mike Crapo of Idaho, Ron Johnson of Wisconsin, John McCain of Arizona, Jerry Moran of Kansas, and John Thune of South Dakota.
- Governor-elect Phil Scott of Vermont.

Including doing polling for SuperPACs in the Senate races in Florida, Iowa, Missouri, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Public Opinion Strategies polled in every GOP Senate key hold except for New Hampshire. The firm also did the polling for the RGA's successful Independent Expenditure effort in the New Hampshire Governor's race.

POS handled the polling for five new Republican Members of Congress, including Andy Biggs (AZ 5), Roger Marshall (KS 1), Claudia Tenney (NY 22), Brian Fitzpatrick (PA 8), and David Kustoff (TN 8). The firm also polled for numerous winning House incumbents and as part of SuperPAC/IE teams in more than 50 races.

The firm also polled for the GOP takeover of the Kentucky State House for the first time since 1920, the GOP takeover in the Minnesota State Senate, and outright control of the New York State Senate. POS also polled for successful legislative campaign efforts in Arizona, Arkansas, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, New Mexico, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Wisconsin.

The firm also conducted the opinion research which guided successful ballot issues in Arizona, Colorado, Florida, Ohio, Oregon, South Dakota, and Texas.
