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A Brief Review of 2020 Ticket-Splitting

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METHODOLOGY



Public Opinion Strategies completed two national surveys of N=800 actual voters conducted on November 3, 2020. These surveys were merged for a total of N=1,600 actual voters nationally.


The surveys was conducted November 3, 2020 and has a margin of error of $\pm 2.45\%$.






Key Findings

The 2020 electorate was not in the mood for ticket-splitting – more than 90% reported voting a straight ballot.






That's at least a 20-year ticket-splitting low.





That shouldn't be surprising considering the increasing negative images that partisans have of the opposing party.





Further, given how extreme attitudes are among partisans, it's not likely to change in the near future.
