




<u>Satisfied/Dissatisfied with State of Economy Over the Past 20 Years – Yearly Averages</u>





Among 41% of Voters who identify as Republicans






The issue priorities vary dramatically by partisanship. Independents very close to Republicans on concern about economic issues.


